Fedora 5.0

- Released in December, 2018
- Aligned with the <u>Fedora API specification</u>
- Separates the API from implementation

Fedora 5.0 is built on modern web standards with a focus on modularity and extensibility.

IMLS Fedora Migration Grant

- Investigating barriers to migration
- Developing recommendations
- Potential for further funding

The grant team plans to submit its report by Fall of 2019.

- Provide transparency and durability
- Achieve better performance and scale
